Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later intereenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

Widow's claim for Bounty Land

To be made by the Widow who has never had a Land Warrant.

State of Virginia County of Albemarle

On this 13th day of August A.D. 1857, personally appeared before me, a Justice of the peace, with in and for the County and State, aforesaid Mrs. Polly Mary Mills aged 76 years, a resident of the County of Albemarle in the State of Virginia who being duly sworn according to law, declares that she is the widow of Zachariah Mills deceased, who was a Capt. or Lieut. in the Revolutionary War commanded by Col. Innis (over 14 days) with Great Britain that she was married to the said Zachariah Mills in Albemarle County Virginia on the 6th day of December in the year 1808, that her maiden name was Mary Catling, that her said husband died in the year (1822 in the County of our mall in the State of Virginia) and that she is now a widow. That she has no written Evidence of marriage & death of her husband than refers to a Commission dated 1778 & memorandum book for his Services.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which she may be entitled under Act of March third, 1855, never having received or applied for bounty land under this or any other Act of Congress.

She hereby appoints John S. & Ro. H. Gallaher, her attorney to prosecute and received her warrant.

State of Virginia County of Albemarle:

On this 13th day of August 1857 personally appeared before me Samuel G. Burnley a Justice of the peace within & for said County and State Mrs. Mary Mills a resident of the County of Albemarle in the State of Virginia who first being duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following statement in order to obtain the benefits of the Act of Congress passed 3rd February 1853 granting pensions to widows of persons who served in the Revolutionary War; that she is the widow of Zachariah Mills who was a Lieut. or Capt. in said War in the militia from the County of Albemarle in said State & that he went to the City of Richmond and also to Williamsburg performing services there & at other places in the year 1781 in all so far as she has

been able to judge about \_\_ months, that he went in service with Wyatt Mills, <sup>2</sup> William Cave & Pat Michie & others who have drawn pensions.

That she was married to the said Mills in the County of Albemarle by one Jacob Watts a minister of the Gospel on the six day of December 1808 or 9 that the said Zachariah Mills died in the County of Albemarle in said State on the \_\_ day of August 1822. That she was not married to him prior to the second of January 1800 but at the time above stated and that she is still his widow.

She hereby constitutes & appoints G W Stevens of Hanover County Virginia her true & lawful attorney with power of substitution to examine all papers in any Department & the file any evidence pertinent to the case & two received a pension certificate in my favor for what time and in what grade his services & Rank [one or more indecipherable words] entitle me as his widow, that she has not received any pension as his widow that she refers to a Commission dated the 3rd day of August 1778 and signed by Patrick Henry as Gov. of the State of Virginia,

She also refers to an old diary or memorandum book used by him in service, and also many memorandum notes &c which are herewith presented; that she has no written evidence in her possession showing the Death or Marriage of them the said Mary Calling [sic] & Z. Mills and refers to the Evidence presented by her attorney.

Camp 27<sup>th</sup> abt 1 Oclock an Alarm marched from there to half Way house. Stayed there till day & then to the Bush tents Stayed there a day or two & then to Wm Robinson's A Respected Citizen, Stayed thare [there] 2 Nights, then to the Bush huts Stayed there till Friday 5<sup>th</sup> Feby came that night to York Town 6<sup>th</sup> Came from there to WmsBurg & stayed there till Thursday 1<sup>st</sup> March Col. Innis called the Capts. together & told them we were to discharged from here Sat<sup>y</sup> [Saturday?] Following 67 \*\* muh [?] my own 17 Mamys [?]

84 \*\* all May 12<sup>th</sup> 1781

[p 35: Lieutenant's commission dated Augt. 13<sup>th</sup> 1778 signed by P. Henry, in favor of Zachariah Mills [looks more like Miles] Gent.]

[file contains a number of documents relating to the widow's efforts to have her pension reinstated after the Civil War.]

[Veteran's widow was initially pensioned at the rate of \$80 per annum for her husband service as a Lieutenant in the Virginia militia.]
