Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## State of Kentucky Christian County Sct

On the fifth day of November 1845 personally appeared before the undersigned Isaac Clarke one of the Judges of the County Court of Christian County and State aforesaid Mary Herndon aged about ninety years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 4<sup>th</sup> 1836 and the act of Congress explanatory of said act passed March 3<sup>rd</sup> 1837.

That she was married to James Herndon who served six months or more in the Army of the Revolution but the particulars of the Service of her said Husband she is not at this distant day [able] to relate and must therefore rely upon the proof she expects to make in pursuance of her claim to be hereafter transmitted from the State of Virginia – that her recollection is clear and distinct that her said Husband served in the Army of the Revolution and that his last term of Service was after the marriage with the said Mary Herndon.

She further states and declares that she was married to the said James Herndon on the \_\_ day of March in the year 1781. That her husband the aforesaid James Herndon died on the \_\_ day of August 1821 in Christian County Kentucky where she has resided ever since.

That she was a widow on the 4<sup>th</sup> day of July 1836 – and still remains a widow as will more fully appear [by] reference being had to the testimony she expects to procure herein.
