Disability: Wounded in the head at the Waxhaws, so as to render him incapable of getting a

livelihood.

Where disabled: Waxhaws. Monthly allowance: \$4.16 2/3

Arrears due: \$300.00

Remarks: There are no rosters of the Virginia line for 1781.
